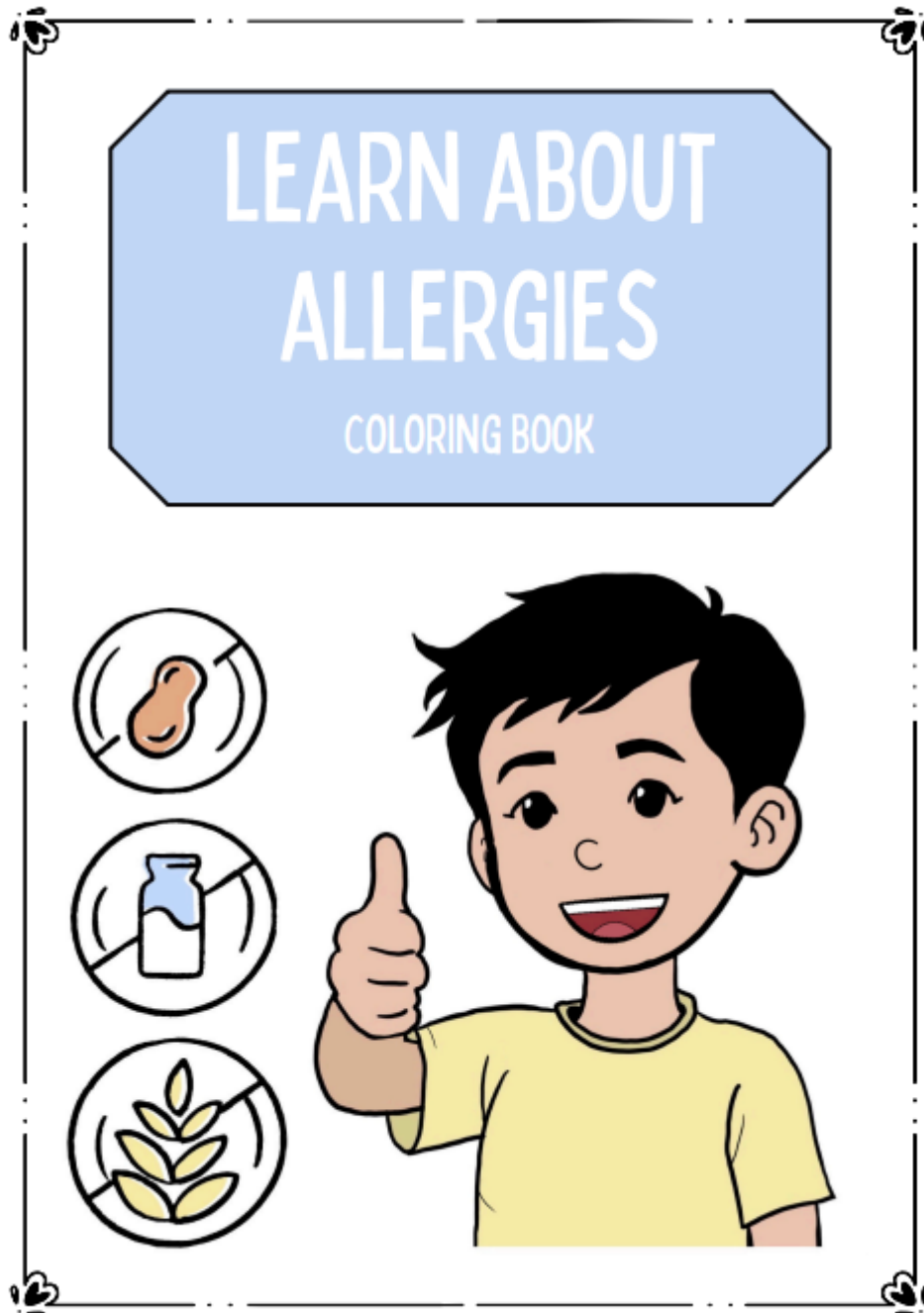


Food Allergies- Epinephrine hints and a free coloring book

As kids head back to school, it's a good time to review how to administer your food-allergic kid's emergency epinephrine. Dr.

-Double check to make sure the medication has not expired. Also, make sure you are giving the school medication that does not expire in the middle of the school year. -What about antihistamine or asthma medications? Yes, go ahead and send them in with your child, but remember, only epinephrine can reverse the life-threatening symptoms of an anaphylaxis. Other medicines like antihistamines cannot stop the reaction.

-Be aware that the safety caps on different epinephrine pens can look different. So, open a pen up, examine it, and refresh your memory on instructions for administration.

-Have at least 2 doses available in case one dose is not working, 911 is taking longer than expected to arrive, or something goes awry with administration of a first dose.

-There is a nasal spray form of epinephrine which is under the brand name Neffy. Since it is newer, check with the school nurse whether they are familiar with administration.
